VOTING RECORD SUMMARY

The *Economic Justice Vermont Legislative Voting Record* tallies the votes from the 2005 and 2006 legislative sessions that reflect a number of issues related to economic justice. It is our intent to educate Vermonters on the voting record of elected officials. We have provided an explanation of the bills selected as well as an indication of the correct vote based on VLWC's legislative priorities for 2005-2006. The priorities are developed and approved by the VLWC steering committee, a statewide coalition of low-wage workers, faith communities, unions, low-income advocacy organizations and social justice organizations.

Overall, Vermont legislators ranked fairly high for supporting economic justice issues. There were a total of 154 Representatives over the course of the two sessions due to a few resignations and appointments. There were 31 Senators due to one death/appointment. Due to the limited number of roll calls in the Vermont Senate, we were able to report on fewer bills in the Senate compared to the House. Since a simple record of roll calls often do not reflect the real debate within the State House, we have offered additional information to explain how legislative committees, the Governor and legislators acted on certain bills.

- 🕒 **Of the 154 Representatives, 74 legislators received rankings of 80% or higher.**
- 🕒 **34 Representatives received rankings of 0%, and 8 received rankings of 100%.**
- 🕒 **Of the 31 Senators, 23 received rankings of 100%. 3 Senators received rankings of 0%.**
- 🕒 **Governor Douglas vetoed H. 524, a bill to create affordable health care for all Vermonters in 2005. He also signed S. 80, the minimum wage bill, behind closed doors in 2005. The**

Governor receives a minimal ranking (60%) based on his lack of leadership on minimum wage and lukewarm support for economic justice bills in 2005 and 2006.

LEGISLATIVE NARRATIVE

MINIMUM WAGE LEGISLATION

S.80 – State Minimum Wage Increase. Passed 2005

VLWC Vote: Y

This Act increased the Vermont minimum wage from \$7.00 to \$7.25 as of January 1, 2006. It also established an annual cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) beginning on January 1, 2007, and each subsequent January 1st the minimum wage shall be increased by the lesser of five percent or the average of: the Consumer Price Index, CPI-U, U.S. city average, not seasonally adjusted, or successor index, as calculated by the U.S. Department of Labor for the 12 months preceding the pervious September 1, whichever is smaller. S. 80 did not increase the tipped minimum wage of \$3.65. Tipped workers include any worker who receives more than \$30.00 in tips each month.

Some roll call votes in the House have an asterisk () next to the vote. This indicates that the representative voted against the bill until the final vote.*

**Senate: Passed 19 (Yeas) to 4 (Nays). House: Passed 90 (Yeas) to 44 (Nays)
Governor: Signed final bill but did so behind closed doors.**

Governor Douglas signed the bill 24 days AFTER the legislature passed the bill. Under state law, bills passed by the legislature become law if the Governor does not take action within five days. The bill is recorded as being passed on June 4, 2006 and sent to the Governor on June 22, 2006. He signed the bill on June 28, 2006. Governor Douglas also directed the Department of Labor to lobby to enact a COLA increase every other year during the legislative debate. The Governor, through DoL, also supported using a smaller index to measure the COLA versus other options, which would result in lower annual increases to the minimum wage.

During the election of 2004, the Governor expressed support for an annual COLA on the minimum wage. In September 2004, the Governor submitted a statement for a Workers' Gubernatorial Candidate's forum which stated, "I signed a minimum wage increase so that all workers receive respectable pay rates and proposed that increases be tied to inflation— guaranteeing a raise for low-wage workers every year."

S. 80 – Zuckerman Amendment. House only, Failed 2005

VLWC Vote: Y

This amendment offered by Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington proposed to amend S. 80 by increasing the minimum wage to \$7.50 on January 1, 2006, and to \$8.00 beginning January 1, 2007. Then beginning January 1, 2008, and on each subsequent January 1, the minimum wage rate shall be increased by the lesser of five percent or the percentage of annual increase in the state average weekly wage as calculated by the Vermont Department of Employment and Training. The average weekly wage is a Vermont based index used to adjust workers' compensation and unemployment compensation benefits.

**House: Failed 15 (Yeas) to 129 (Nays)
Governor: No Action**

S. 80 – Marron Amendment. House only, Passed 2005

VLWC Vote: N

This amendment offer by Rep. Marron of Stowe amended S. 80 by removing a cost-of-living adjustment increase to the tipped minimum wage rate. As a result, the tipped minimum wage rate of \$3.65 remained the same.

**House: Passed 78 (Yeas) to 58 (Nays)
Governor: Signed final bill (see S. 80)**

S. 80 – Clark Amendment. House only, Failed 2005**VLWC Vote: N**

This amendment offered by Rep. Clark of Vergennes, proposed to remove the cost-of-living adjustment and increase the minimum wage from \$7.00 to \$7.25 on January 1, 2007.

House: Failed 48 (Yeas) to 79 (Nays)**Governor: No Action**

S.245 – Tipped Min. Wage Increase. Senate Committee, No Vote 2006**VLWC Vote: Y**

Introduced by Senator Richard Sears, this bill proposed adding to the tipped minimum wage the same cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) that was attached to the general minimum wage rate in 2005 (see S. 80) beginning on January 1, 2007.

The Senate Economic Development Committee heard several tipped workers, advocates, union leaders and business owners testify in support of increasing the tipped minimum wage rate. Despite many indications that the committee would take a vote on the bill before crossover (early March legislative deadline for a bill to move from one chamber to the next), the committee never voted. As a result, S. 245 “died.” Senate Committee members include: Sen. Illuizzi (Essex-Caledonia), Sen. Dunne (Windsor), Sen. MacDonald (Orange), Sen. Miller (Chittenden), Sen. Mullin (Rutland), and Sen. Gander (Windham).

Senate: No Vote Taken in Senate Economic Development Committee. House: No Action. Bill failed to pass Senate.**Governor: No Action. Bill failed to pass legislature.**

ECONOMIC JUSTICE RELATED LEGISLATION

S.41 – Unemployment Compensation for Survivors of Domestic Violence. Passed 2005**VLWC Vote: Y**

This Act establishes the domestic and sexual violence survivors’ transitional employment program to provide temporary partial wage replacement to individuals who must leave employment, without good cause attributable to the employer, because of circumstances directly resulting from domestic violence, sexual assault or stalking.

Senate: Passed 26 (Yeas) to 1 (Nay) House: No roll call was taken. The bill passed by voice vote.**Governor: Signed bill**

S.175 – Enabling Communities and the State to Adequately Consider the Impacts and Costs of Large Scale Retail Development. Passed Senate, No Vote in House 2006**VLWC Vote: Y**

This bill requires that all applicants for large-scale (75,000 sq. ft. or more) retail use provide funding for a community and regional impact study including projected costs and benefits to the region. The study will include the impacts on any existing downtown area, public services and infrastructure, job loss or creation, property values, character, traffic, and how much revenue will be retained or directed back into the local community. The bill also mandates that no large-scale retail use may have any adverse effects on the abilities of adjacent municipalities to provide public services and that a state study to show the impact of large retailers on state public assistance programs must be completed by January 2007.

Senate: Passed 20 (Yeas) to 5 (Nays). House: No Vote Taken**Governor: No Action**

H. 524 – Green Mountain Health Bill. Vetoed by Governor 2005**VLWC Vote: Y**

The bill intended to create an integrated health care system in Vermont by 2009. The system would provide all Vermonters with access to affordable, high quality health care that is financed in a fair and equitable manner. Green Mountain Health would provide primary and preventive health care coverage to all uninsured Vermonters beginning July 2006. The bill contained a cost containment mechanism to address financing, delivery, and quality of health services.

The system would be financed by the "Health Effort Tax," where all are covered and all contribute to reduce the cost shift. Employers who spend at least 3% of payroll on health care and small employers (\$50,000 payroll) who spend at least 1% on health care would pay nothing. Employers not making minimum contribution would pay 1% of first \$50,000 and 3% of remaining payroll (minus any health care spending). Individuals with health coverage in 9 months of the reporting year would pay nothing. Individuals without health coverage would pay 1% of adjusted gross income.

The voting record reports the roll call on the final approval of the conference committee in the House and Senate. It also reports the roll call on an amendment to weaken the health care bill by Rep. Koch and the veto override vote in the House.

**Senate: 18 (Yeas) to 7 (Nays). House: 79 (Yeas) to 55 (Nays)
Governor: Vetoed**

H. 524 – Koch Amendment. House Only, Failed 2005

VLWC Vote: N

This amendment offered by Rep. Koch of Barre Town, proposed to strike the full text of H. 524 and create a study committee to examine the health care system.

We designed a "no" vote on this amendment because all Vermonters need health care now. A study committee would delay the process of enacting real change to our current health care system.

**House: 57 (Yeas) to 86 (Nays) Senate: No Action
Governor: No Action.**

H. 524 – Override Veto Vote. House Only, Failed 2006

VLWC Vote: Y

The House attempted to override the Governor's veto on the first day of the 2006 session. The House did not pass the override, so the Senate did not take a vote.

**House: 81 (Yeas) to 63 (Nays) (2/3 majority needed to pass). Senate: No Action
Governor: No Action**

H.861 – Health Care Affordability for All Vermonters. Passed 2006.

VLWC Vote: Y

This Act established the Catamount Health program, which allows insurers in the state to offer Catamount Health as a carrier and includes a chronic care management program. Uninsured Vermonters are eligible to purchase the program. Uninsured Vermont residents under 300% of Federal Poverty Level (FPL) without access to employer sponsored insurance as good as Catamount Health qualify for the program based on a sliding premium cost. Individuals over 300% can purchase at full cost.

The Act also offers Employer-Sponsored Insurance. It increased VHAP's flexibility for which employer plans are approved and protects individuals by wrapping benefits & cost-sharing. The Act includes Common Sense Initiatives such as Healthy Lifestyle Insurance Discounts, etc.

Some roll call votes in the House have an asterisk () next to the vote. This indicates that the representative voted against the bill because the health care bill did not go far enough in establishing a true universal health care system.*

**House:88 (Yeas) to 54 (Nays) Senate:20 (Yeas) to 4 (Nays)
Governor: Signed bill.**
